

Diarmaid Ó Murchú took over temporarily from Dan as President, and brought to the role decades of experience and a vision for the future. Very recently, College Principal Marcelline Cody has been appointed College President. We wish her every success in that challenging role but know that with her at the helm and with its dedicated staff CCR is well placed to face the challenges of the new decade.

The Union lost one of its legendary figures last Summer with the death after a very short illness of Noel McCarthy. Carol Service:

Although it is now a few months since we celebrated Christmas the memories of the success of the various features that mark Christmas in the College are still fresh. The expansion of the College music programme was in evidence at the Christmas Carol Service when the students provided the musical accompaniment for the College choir with the invited guests who included large numbers of parents and past pupils. The Carol Service has become the centrepiece of the College's celebration of Christmas and it may happen that we will not be able to accommodate all-comers next year. The large attendance enjoyed refreshments in the refectory with the monks from the Abbey, the Board of Governors, College parents, teachers, present and past students. Congratulations to Mr William Cullagh, Head of Music and his team of teachers who have brought participation levels in music and instrumental classes to new heights of achievement. There are now more than one hundred students learning and playing instruments in the College. The variety of instruments (seventeen different instruments covered) has enriched the programme and enhanced the development of a culture that embraces traditional music, classical music, jazz, blues and the usual popular music of the day.

Rugby:

The two major competitions saw significant progress by the Senior and Junior Cup teams. We are all proud of the progress that they made before being eliminated. The Senior Cup team were narrowly defeated by St. Mary's College in the Leinster quarter-final although they dominated possession for most of the game. The College community is proud of the team's performance which almost brought them to the semi-final of the competition. They did well in the Plate competition before losing in a tight game to Newbridge College. The Junior Cup team put up a similar courageous display before eventually losing to Wesley College.

The attendance of so many pastmen at both games is deeply appreciated by the entire College community. Their presence is always a source of motivation for the players and the college staff.

The Senior III team had a great season in the league before finally losing to Belvedere in the knock out stages.

Roscrea team take All Ireland debtating title:

The event was held in the Gresham Hotel, Dublin, on 25 March 2010. This national competition has been organized by Gael Linn since 1960, and over 150 teams from secondary schools throughout the country took part this year.

Guest chairperson on the night, Fiach Mac Conghail, Director of the Abbey Theatre, conducted the proceedings with great aplomb. A previous winner of the competition himself in 1980 with Coláiste Eoin, Dublin, he told the large gathering present that participating in the competition all those years ago had, in no small measure, helped him in his career to date.

In the senior section of the competition, the young orators spoke knowledgeably on the topical motion 'Tá cúis ghearáin ag oibrithe na hearnála poiblí!' (Public sector workers have reason to complain!) and many interesting arguments were put forward by each speaker. There were cheers of delight from their supporters when it was announced that the Cistercian College students were the 2010 All-Ireland Champions! They won out over teams from Presentation College, Cork; St. Michael's Loreto, Navan, Co. Meath and Alexandra College, Dublin. Teacher, Nicola Ní Bhraonáin, who has helped and directed the team on the road to success since November last, was justifiably proud of her students. She herself captained a team to victory in the 1999 final of this prestigious competition while a pupil in the Presentation Secondary School, Loughboy, Kilkenny!

The victorious team was presented with the Gael Linn perpetual trophy and a cheque for €1,000, Congratulating the winners on their great achievement, Gael Linn CEO Antoine Ó Coileáin said: 'While we applaud the growth in all-Irish schooling in the past twenty years, Gael Linn believes that a high standard of Irish in mainstream schools is vital to the revival effort. Irish is the common inheritance of all and it is for this reason that Gael Linn seeks to support the use Irish in the wider community. We are particularly proud of the fact that the Gael Linn Debates this year celebrate their golden jubilee and that they continue to develop students' language skills year after year.'

Many well-known personalities have taken part in the Gael Linn debates over the past 50 years – including the recently appointed European Commissioner, Máire Geoghegan-Quínn, politicians Alan Dukes, Minister Mary Hanafin, T.D. and Senator Ronan Mullen; broadcasters/journalists Marian Finucane, Mary Kennedy, Evanne Ní Chuilinn and Harry McGee; former GAA president, Seosamh Mac Donncha, Judge Mary Laffoy and funny man, Dara Ó Briain – and there is no doubt that their debating skills helped in many ways to further their respective careers! (And the present Editor of the Roscrea Review, though he froze on the night and we didn't get past the first Round!)

Gold Medal:

The Ignatius Houlihan gold medal for public speaking was won by Emmet Ryan. The event was judged by pastman Conor Brady (no mean speaker himself in his time), and the standard was the highest for many years. The continuing interest in public speaking in the College is a tribute to those who started, built and fostered that tradition.

Sherry Cup:

The Sherry Cup is due to take place this term. It is a key part of the long tradition of musical performance and singing. It is awarded annually to individuals for performing, singing or playing an instruments or instruments. With the expansion of music in the College this award has assumed even greater importance in the annual prize-giving.

History Students:

The Sixth-Year History students have visited a number of sites of historical significance in Ulster as part of their preparation for the Leaving Certificate examination. The visits included tours of the Derry walls, Enniskillen, Omagh and Stormont. The recent history of Northern Ireland is now a significant part of the Leaving Certificate programme and Ms Freda Smyth and Mr Niall McVeigh have gone to great lengths to ensure that the students met some of the people who were involved in the politics of the time. We are deeply grateful to them for this work.



Fully recovered from his recent illness, Peter Power made a welcome return to the CCR Reunion. Cork native Fearghal O'Dubhgall was down from Dublin for the weekend. John and Marie Lynch made the short journey from Mallow. John and Liz Kenny shared a table with Billy and Mary O'Neill. The class of '69 was represented by Seamus Mulherin. Other supporters of the event were Cuimin and Lena Doyle, Kevin and Frances Morrissey, Gerard and Joan Malone and Cathal and Marie Bredin.

Special guests for the night were long standing family friends of the Branch Chairman, Tony Reddin and his wife Maura. Legendary Tipperary Goalkeeper, Tony was selected for both the, "Hurling Team of the Century" in 1984. and the GAA's "Hurling Team of the Millennium" at which time he had the rather unusual distinction in being one of the few living Irish people featured on a postage stamp. He features prominently in current internet discussions on the "Hurling Team of the first 125 years of the GAA".

A native of Mullagh, Co. Galway, he played his club hurling with the Lorrha club in Tipperary. He had many admirers throughout Tipperary and especially so in Roscrea. It was probably this which prompted CCR teacher and Hurling coach Rody Ryan to arrange a number of challenge matches between Lorrha and the CCR team from 1952 to 1955.

A player on the CCR teams of 1953/54 and captain in 1955 was former Union President, Pat O'Shea. Pat went on to win an All Ireland Minor Hurling medal with Kilkenny as well as 2 Fitzgibbon Cups with UCC.

We were delighted to welcome Pat and his wife Margaret to Longueville. Pat vividly recalled those matches which took place over 50 years ago in what was called the Legion Field. Given Tony Reddin's reputation, the CCR players' only objective was to put a goal on the scoresheet. They were encouraged beforehand to do this by team trainer Rody Ryan who made a "tangible contribution" in his role as referee for the games. Pat willingly admitted that despite being awarded some close in frees towards the end of the games, Reddin's goal usually remained intact.

Pat and Gerry regaled the attendance with some anecdotes from Tony's long hurling career. Given that Tony holds three All Ireland medals and five Railway Cup medals gained during the era of Christy Ring, Jack Lynch, Nicky Rackard et al. there were plenty of controversial and humorous incidents.

When they left Lorrha in 1960, Tony and Maura settled in Banagher Co. Offaly. Tony was very much involved in training the local St. Rynagh's club and made a significant contribution to the resurgence in Offaly Hurling. One beneficiary of this was CCR Pastman and neighbour of the Reddin family, Shane McGuckin who won an All Ireland medal with Offaly in 1994, the year they back from nowhere to beat Limerick.

At end of the function, Tipperary man and College President Dan Smyth presented Tony Reddin with a plaque displaying the College crest.





NEW WEBSITE LAUNCHED

2009 certainly has been a year of change. Obama took office in the US. The Lisbon Referendum was ratified across the European Union and a new Abbot was elected in Mount Saint Joseph Abbey, Roscrea. It is fitting that in this period of change our new website is launched. Just as Abbot Emeritus Dom Kevin has handed over the mantle of leading Mount Saint Joseph Abbey to his successor Dom Richard, Michael Coyle has handed over the leadership of the CCR Union to his successor Gerard O' Meara. Since the early part of 2009, CCR Union has been in the process of harnessing information technology to afford Pastmen of CCR richer engagement with each other and the institution that has played a major part in their development.

Eddie O'Sullivan – A TRIBUTE

The retirement of long-serving housemaster, Eddie O'Sullivan, represents a milestone in the life of the College. For generations of past students, Eddie is synonymous with Roscrea. Throughout our years in school he was a constant; a reassuringly dependable presence, particularly in times of transition and uncertainty.

His career has seen exponential change in Irish society, changes to which Mount St Joseph has not been immune. Taking up his appointment in the Ireland of the Pope's visit, he retired as we reappraised our faith in our political, corporate and religious institutions. Entering a school which had considerable daily involvement by the monks, he left at a time when this is no longer feasible, even to a minimal degree. In thirty years of service, Eddie was repeatedly confronted with all the vicissitudes of school life; successes, disappointments, tensions, challenges and changes, to name but a few. He was a key player as the school community grappled with an ever-changing educational, economic, cultural and social landscape. He had to adapt to the effects of these major changes on college structures, parents and, most critically, the students in his care.

The celebrated American jurist Oliver Wendell Holmes stated: "The life of the law is not logic, but experience." Perhaps the same could be said of a boarding school. Eddie gained a wealth of experience which ensured the smooth running of the residential side of the house. He was tremendously energetic, diligent and just. Of all his qualities, fairness was his hallmark. He did not have favourites, nor did he hold grudges. Anyone reprimanded by Eddie, whatever their outward protestations, usually admitted subsequently that they were guilty as charged. His capacity to resume civil relations and "move on" after confrontations with students earned him widespread admiration and respect. A former colleague recalls him as "the supreme builder of morale and harmonious relationships among staff".

As befits a character in the true sense, Eddie features in many Roscrea anecdotes. A full collection of past student reminiscences about him would run to several volumes, and the present writer offers just a few by way of non-exhaustive sample. A particularly vivid recollection relates to a conspiratorial and colourful conversation after "lights out" in the Double Window dormitory in second year. In the midst of our intrigue, the chief conspirator said nervously: "Lads, I think there's another person in the room." Right on cue, a powerful torch came on and Eddie boomed: "You're dead right! And one would think that butter wouldn't melt in your mouth!" Before a house captains' election we were urged to vote wisely. Eddie concluded his counsel with the immortal



line: "Don't just vote for some – dunderhead!" Needless to say, quite a number voted for an individual of that name, although Eddie's plea for responsible voting carried the day. On another occasion, a lecture after Morning Prayer was prefaced by an acknowledgment: "I know I'm not hip. I'm not hop. I'm not cool..." A housemaster laying claim to such qualities would surely be treated with well-deserved suspicion! Sound bites like these alleviated our adolescent gloom, and made Eddie an icon.

In a boarding school, what happens outside the classroom – in recreation, sport, study, the refectory and the dormitories - is crucial to the establishment's overall success. Increased affluence, growing secularism and much greater competition for university places were probably the developments which impacted most upon these areas during Eddie's tenure. The house staff has not always received the recognition it deserves, but Eddie's contribution places its vital role in sharp relief. It is his stellar achievement that he was both an effective disciplinarian and a human face, a fact reflected by the esteem in which he was held by current and former students alike. He had great loyalty to the institution, but never at the expense of the students. Rarely does one encounter somebody as sincere, and rarely are the praises of a published tribute so richly deserved. Kind, genuine and forgiving, Eddie brought all the attributes of a Christian gentleman to his post. He truly earned the oft-heard refrain - and the highest praise a Roscrea student can bestow - "Eddie is sound".

Seán studied medicine in UCG, qualifying in 1967 and is a GP in Portumna. He is married to Noreen and has four grown up children and four grandchildren. Two of his sons, Declan, a consultant urologist in London and Brian, a chartered physiotherapist in Portumna attended CCR in the 1980s.

As the photos suggest the event was most enjoyable with good craic and banter as well as fine speeches honouring a great servant of the CCR Union. A feature of the night was the number of young pastmen present. We look forward to another great night in the West in the near future!

LUMEN CHRISTI

The Stained Glass Windows of Mount Saint Joseph Abbey

A masterpiece! A treasure! Inspiring and awesome! These are just some of the comments used to describe Lumen Christi, the book recently published by Mount Saint Joseph Abbey on the extensive array of stained glass windows in the monastery.

A Tribute to Pat Sheedy

Pat Sheedy has retired from the staff of Cistercian College after 31 years of dedicated and trojan service to the teaching profession and as many years of warm camaraderie as a colleague. To say that he is missed is an understatement and there are no words that I can use to adequately capture the man. Pat is a man of many interests and talents, but more than these combined, he has enormous generosity of spirit and nothing is entered with less than full commitment and enthusiasm.

I have known Pat for forty years or more, originally through family connections and all the Sheedy family from Clashagad were highly respected friends by our 'tribe' for as long as I can recall. My grand-aunt Susan Cantwell was a regular visitor to the Sheedy home and the Sheedys were among her most treasured friends. Consequently, as a young boy, I knew of Pat Sheedy (and indeed all his family) long before we first met.

Pat's 'grá' for hurling is well known. His first loyalty was, and still is, to the 'Black and Reds' of Moneygall with whom he distinguished himself at different levels on the hurling field. He also went on to play for St. Flannan's College, Ennis as a schoolboy hurler. His university education was at University College, Galway and his talents were once again to be seen at the highest level, gaining recognition not only at Fitzgibbon Cup level but also on the Combined Universities Team which played in the Railway Cup competition. His playing career did not end there however and Pat continued to play for Moneygall where his achievements included winning back-to-back Tipperary Senior Hurling Championships in 1975 (as captain) and 1976.

1978 saw Pat move to CCR from Carmelite College, Moate and immediately this young man settled in to the joys of a six-day working week and many enjoyable hours of hurling as a coach. Not long afterwards, a young lady from the west of Ireland arrived onto the teaching staff, one Miss Pauline Flaherty. To make a long story short, by the time I joined the College staff in September 1982, Mr. & Mrs Sheedy were happily married, the only couple on the staff of CCR!

Pat Sheedy is well known too as a racontour. He has wonderful stories for any occasion and delivers them with panache. As a historian too, Pat has few equals, though former colleague Aodh Mac Domhnaill has oft times disputed Pat's interpretation of 'revisionism'. As a Gaeilgeoir, Pat is also in an elite for sweet, flowing and flawless delivery of beautiful Irish. And if all these gifts weren't enough, Pat Sheedy is as sharp of memory for facts, figures and general knowledge as any person I know. Any unresolved issues at staff level on such matters were usually referred to our memory man-Pat Sheedy.



In spite on an aversion to modern technology, (especially computers and photocopiers) Pat Sheedy was a man of significant innovation during his years at CCR. It was Pat, along with Chris O'Donoghue who pioneered and nurtured the Transition Year 'Romania' project which combined forces with two schools in Northern Ireland to fundraise and visit orphanages in a most challenged part of Europe. Great credit is due to Pat in particular for his tireless devotion, both to his students as TY coordinator and to the cause of these forgotten children in frightfully neglected Eastern European conditions. It was also Pat who developed links with St. Mary's School in Belfast which led to many exchange hurling and cultural visits in both directions. It was Pat who promoted Corn an tAth Eanna, an annual hurling blitz competition hosted by the College and it was he who set up the coveted Afternoon Tea Party for his Leaving Cert students at St. Flannan's Park (the home of hurling) in Moneygall.

Pat Sheedy trained hurling teams year in, year out, and his enthusiasm never waned whether or not he had championship material. He introduced many of the famous GAA players and personalities to the school as visiting coaches or as guest speakers. What a fitting finale to a long and successful coaching career that in his final competitive outing, his team captured the coveted Fitzgerald (no relation!!) Shield for the college

It is often said that if you want something done well, ask a busy man. Pat Sheedy is a busy man. Outside of his professional life, Pat is currently President of Roscrea Golf Club (and also a dreaded opponent in match play!). He is also on the national Executive of the Irish Hereford Breeders Association. His dedication to his beloved Moneygall Hurling Club has never waned.

In conclusion, Pat Sheedy has vacated the Staffroom of Cistercian College. His absence is only a physical one however - men like 'Sheedy' are not forgotten.

Dom Richard's **Abbatial Blessing**

Despite all appearances to the contrary, Dom Kevin reached the age when abbots must retire last year. On Bloomsday of all days (Gerry Moloney will love this), the community together with the abbots of the daughter houses, met in chapter for an abbatial election. The community chose Fr Richard as its new abbot. As Fr Richard was technically ineligible for election both due to his age and number of years of profession, the community had to vote by a two-thirds majority that he be postulated as abbot. Canon Law requires that a monk be seven years in Solemn Vows before he can be elected as abbot, while the Constitutions of the Cistercian Order state that a monk must be 35 years of age in order to be eligible for election.

Following the election the proceedings had to be suspended while the necessary dispensations were sought from the Holy See and the Abbot General. On the morning of Wednesday, 17th June, Cardinal Franc Rodé, Cardinal-Prefect of the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life issued to Dom Eamon Fitzgerald, the Cistercian Abbot General in Rome, the dispensation in relation to the shortfall in years of profession. On receipt of this dispensation, the Abbot General then dispensed with the minimum age requirement and confirmed the election of Dom Richard as Abbot of Mount St Joseph Abbey.

Having received both dispensations and the confirmation of the election of Dom Richard as abbot,

Dom Richard with his two immediate predecessors as abbot, Dom Kevin and Dom Laurence.

Dom Michael Ahern, superior of Mount Melleray and Father Immediate of Mount St Joseph convened the community and announced the confirmation and then proceeded with the installation of the new abbot. handing him the keys and seal of the monastery, installing him in the Abbot's throne in the Chapter Room and giving him the pectoral cross. The community then processed to the Abbey Church singing the Te Deum.

Almost a month later, on Saturday 11th July, the feast of St. Benedict, Most Rev William Walsh DD, Bishop of Killaloe, blessed Dom Richard during Mass in the Abbey Church, Large crowds packed the Church to be present for this important occasion for the Cistercian community at Mount Saint Joseph.

Abbots and abbesses from numerous other communities in Ireland and further afield came to join with the monastic community of Roscrea in their wonderful celebration. Many musicians and singers were present to enrich the liturgy through the Mass. An air of jubilation was present throughout, heightening this momentous occasion in the life of Mount Saint Joseph. A large number of pastmen were present, as were current and former members of staff. The photos included here give a flavour of what was a very happy occasion.

Naturally we wish Dom Richard well in his role as abbot, which, of course also means he is the new Patron of the Union, the first non-pastman to hold the office since 1964.

Noel McCarthy R.I.P.

(CCR 1948 - 1953)

Noel and I grew up in Ennis – literally next door – same age. Noel's Dad, Dr. G.P. McCarthy also a Roscrea pastman was Union President in 1947/'48 and so we both found ourselves in CCR in September 1948. As we were still in the "emergency" years we had to bring our own ration books, as sugar, butter and tea were still in short supply.

I was no sportsman, but Noel played on the Rugby JCT. We were in CCR for Fr. Ailbe's last year and can vividly remember him demonstrating from the rostrum in the "Ref" how to top a boiled egg!

On one occasion Noel and I hitched back to Roscrea with his brothers taking our luggage on the train. At Roscrea station enquiries were made about us and our misdemeanour was revealed. Fr. Thomas was not impressed by our mode of transport and we were told to go home by train and come back properly. At Roscrea we bought tickets for Cloughjordan, got off there and hitched home. Our parents were not pleased to see us — in fact they were worried we might have been expelled, but on our explaining sent us back to Roscrea the next day. Sadly for us, our nemesis Fr. Thomas had checked with the station and found out about the tickets to Cloughjordan. Our punishment was both public and painful!

Although we were both cast as fairies in *Iolanthe* and as sisters in *HMS Pinafore*, we never made the grade after our voices broke. In those days, achievement was marked by having on your jacket lapel a Pioneer pin, a Child of Mary medal and a Gold Fáinne. Looking back at the 1951 Fiolar, I can see that we were both also in the Legion of Mary and the Middle Debating Society. Our spiritual director in the Legion was Fr. Dermot who in later years was a colossus of the Union and a welcome guest at many Kenmare weekends.

Noel finished up with seven honours in his Leaving Cert. As I recall, most were in the 60-70% bracket which showed fine judgement and economy of effort. How ironic that such a fine surgeon would never have made it to medical school with such a result if the current Points Race were a feature of our times!

We both went to UCC and Noel qualified as a doctor in 1959. We both acted as best man for each other. Noel married UCC classmate Ada Sutton from Cork and like many young graduates of their time went to the USA. Early in his career there he served in the US Army and was part of a field hospital mobilised in Florida at the time of the Cuban missile crisis.

Noel received a Master's degree in Public Health from Yale and went on to have a long and distinguished career as an obstetrician/gynaecologist in New Haven, Connecticut. He maintained that the secret to his good relationship with his patients was, always to talk openly and honestly to them. Side

by side with his busy practice he was very involved with the New England Obstetricians and Gynaecologists Society. He was, for many years their Programme Director and organised their biannual professional meetings, and also served a term as their president. His success in organising well attended meetings and attracting top experts from other countries including Ireland helped build the society's membership. He also organised overseas meetings for them including trips to Ireland.

Noel also formed a twenty five year relationship with the Irish Institute of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists. With the late Dr. John Stronge and Dr. Dermot McDonald, both former masters of Holles St. they brought groups and guest speakers both ways across the Atlantic to the benefit of their colleagues here and in America. Those meetings were also responsible for forming many lasting friendships. Noel's energy, spirit and leadership qualities were what maintained this enjoyable and educational programme.

Almost incidental to this he was a great ambassador for Irish tourism. He usually arranged that his American colleagues would spend some time in Ireland, and by arranging meetings here he brought much business to Dromoland Castle, Ashford Castle and the Park, Kenmare. In recognition of his work for furthering medical education he received a merit award at the 2008 meeting of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists. He was also made an honorary Fellow of the Institute of Obstetrics and Gynaecology of the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland.

Despite his busy professional life, Noel found time to be a tireless fundraiser for his Alma Maters in Ireland and the US and was also himself a major contributor. He raised substantial funds in the US for CCR and also for UCC. In the US he was a member of the Board of Trustees of the St. Raphael Foundation which raised funds for the hospital where he had been a consultant. He was the main driving force behind the North American Branch of the CCR Union whose November meetings he always attended. He would also bring a group of friends to the Annual Kenmare weekend of which he and his brother Ger were pillars. Some years ago, the Union

recognised his contribution by making him an Honorary Life Vice President.

Noel's leisure time passion was sailing. His first experience's were with his father-in-law Eric Sutton in Cork. In the US he was a member of the Milford Yacht Club on Long Island Sound, and the Sarasota Sailing Squadron in Florida. He and his three sons Kevin, Paul and Brendan were very competitive sailors and regulars on the prize lists.

His life was struck with tragedy when his wife Ada developed symptoms of Alzheimers shortly after retiring in her mid fifties. He was a devoted husband and nothing could demonstrate this more clearly than his commitment to Ada during the long years of her illness. He was tireless in his efforts to get her the best possible treatment and quality of life. During the final years of her illness in the Alzheimers Resource Center he would prepare the meals he knew she liked and even from Florida he would pack and freeze them to have them for her. He was devastated by her loss and continued to speak fondly of her in the four years since her death. He brought her ashes to be buried in Cork.

Even when he retired in 2004 Noel continued to be very active as a conference organiser, an amateur travel agent for his professional groups and an extensive traveller himself. He continued to enjoy his sailing in Milford and Sarasota. He loved a party, and would happily cook for big groups of friends. In Sarasota he brought together groups including many Irish-American medics who would never have met but for Noel's ability to organise a party often when he had visitors from Ireland. In Dublin and Cork he organised meetings of his extended family and cousins met who would never have done so otherwise.

Noel died on 22nd July 2009 in St. Raphael's hospital where he had worked for so many years. His short illness and death were unexpected as he had been in Ireland in early March for the tragic funeral of his niece Ciara, the daughter of his brother Gerald (CCR 1951-'56).

Noel will be sadly missed by his sons and their families, by Gerald and his family in Cork and by his sister Rosemary in Scotland. To all his nephews and nieces he was a generous uncle. Finally he will be missed by a wide circle of friends in the USA and here in Ireland.

Noel McCarthy (Roscrea 1948 – 1953)

Noel McCarthy, who died on July 22nd 2009 in New Haven, Connecticut after a brief illness was a really good man; kind, generous, funny, an accomplished sailor, a distinguished clinical professor at Yale Medical School, a gifted obstetriciangynaecologist who was loved and respected by his patients and medical colleagues, a loyal friend and good at everything that matters. There was not an empty seat in the huge Dominican church on Hillhouse Avenue, New Haven where his funeral mass was celebrated. In a eulogy, his oldest and closest friend Owen Fox (Roscrea 1948 – 1953) moved the congregation to laughter and tears as he spoke about Noel's life and their 71 year friendship.

I first met Noel at about 10pm on November 18th, 1967 when he introduced himself in a labour room at the Yale – New Haven Hospital, a few hours before my wife Biddy gave birth to our first son. He and I were both delighted to meet another Roscrea man and we spent the next hour laughing at stories about Gerry Pan, Fr Eanna and other fondly remembered Roscrea characters. Biddy, who was two weeks overdue and writhing uncomfortably and ignored in the bed, was not amused, but quickly forgave us both when Noel began to work his magic. We were friends ever afterwards.

Noel was a great leader and organizer and it was impossible to avoid infection by his enthusiasms. When his son Paul served in Afghanistan as a U.S Army Captain at the Mehtar Lam Forward Operating Base, building infrastructure and roads and introducing programs aimed at improving the lives of people in the villages and hinterlands, Noel emailed his contact list and encouraged them to send clothes and shoes to Paul to tog out the local kids. After a few months, Paul had to get Noel's email list and write, begging people to stop sending supplies, because his unit had run out of storage.

For many years, Noel was the guiding force behind the New England Obstetrical & Gynaecological Society. He did a stint as president, but more importantly, he was its program director for over 20 years and organized its well attended biannual professional meetings, to which he invited top international experts, including a fair share from Ireland. He organized overseas meetings and brought many of his American colleagues to Ireland, the lecture series often timed to coincide with international rugby matches. He was often accompanied by his UCC Medical School classmate, fellow Ob-Gyn and great pal, Bosco Cardozo. In 2008, Noel was honoured by the American College of Obstetrics & Gynaecology for his outstanding contributions to medical education in New England.

Noel loved Roscrea. When his brother Ger was President of the Union, Noel tracked down the American pastmen and founded the North American Branch. He never accepted the Chairmanship, but he was the heart and soul of the branch, a tireless organizer, generous donor and the long term liaison man with the School and the Union. The first Branch Chairman Paddy Boland and his successors through Des O'Brien were all tapped for the job by Noel in a corner of Langan's Bar & Grill in New York and could count on Noel's enthusiastic and selfless support. He never missed a major Roscrea event in Ireland and he was a stalwart at the Kenmare Weekend each year.

Noel was great fun and he loved parties. He took great pleasure in introducing people and in helping to build lasting friendships. Because we did not live close to each other, much of the time I spent with him over the years was in bars, either in the U.S or Ireland. Because of his engaging nature, he invariably attracted a lively discussion group. He reckoned that his innate comfort with the setting was due in part to an incident in his early childhood. When he was about six months continued on next page

old, a long-time family friend passing through Ennis, stopped off at the McCarthy house. Noel's father, who was the County Medical Officer was off on his rounds, so the friend, Mrs McCarthy and Noel went for a drive along the coast and stopped for a few drinks at a pub where the craic was good. In high spirits, the adults headed off home to Ennis, realizing only upon arrival that Noel had been left on the bar counter in a bassinet. Upon return, they found Noel in the pub surrounded by admirers. He was confident that the experience was formative.

Noel was a loving family man and he was devastated by the death a few years ago of his adored wife Ada., nee Sutton, of Cork, who was also a physician. He will be sadly missed by his three sons, Kevin, Paul and Brendan, all of whom he trained to be top-class sailors, his daughters in law and his grandchildren, his brother Gerald, sister Rosemary and their families and by a wide circle of friends inside and outside the Roscrea community.

Joseph McMahon (CCR 1944-'49) died January 2nd 2009 after a brief illness. Born in Dublin, he moved to Clonmel in 1959 and was the owner of McMahon's Shoes in O'Connell St., Clonmel, as well as having business interests in Limerick, Waterford and Tipperary. A founder member of Clonmel Lions Club, a charter member of Clonmel Chamber of Commerce he was well known for his selfless voluntary work down through the years.

Getting the Right Formula

Two CCR Students have distilled the Junior Certificate Science Syllabus into a new Revision Book and it is selling like hot cakes

Last year, two students from CCR compiled a new Science Revision Book for the Junior Certificate.

The book entitled "Quick Questions & Accurate Answers" has continued on an upward spiral and the Revision Guide has become so popular that the boys have launched it nationwide.

"We realised its potential early on", explains Kevin Ryan (Grandson of Rody Ryan). "There was so much interest in our own school that most of the Junior Certificate Class purchased it and then we decided to take a nationwide approach".

That meant getting the word out to as many schools as possible. How is that done? Well you start by getting the attention of the local media outlets and then go from there. "We've had a huge response from schools in the surrounding area and its already in about 50 bookshops explains co-author Emmet Ryan. "In order to do that, we sent letters to other schools, went on some local radio stations and did interviews with newspapers". All in all they have sold over 1,000 copies of the book and at €10 a copy, it does not take a genius to figure out how well they're doing.

It does however, require a lot of smarts to put together a Science Revision Book that can compete with the others already out there but the two boys believe they have an advantage over their competitors. "Nobody can understand better the areas hardest for students to grasp than students themselves," says Emmet. "Teachers, who generally write textbooks, have Degrees and Masters in their fields, so it's sometimes difficult for them to reproduce information in a way that students will be able to understand. Our book is written in a very simple format: short questions and short answers in Biology, Physics and Chemistry".

"Quick Questions & Accurate Answers" is divided into the three main science subject sections, with several subsections in each. Each of these is conveniently equipped with a doodle box and some reminder questions from the previous section, just in case you weren't paying attention.

"Junior Cert Textbooks changed to adapt to the need of the new

Science Syllabus but the format hasn't", says Kevin. "The information has been updated but the bulky layout remains. You will have to plough through loads of text to get the information you need, even though the exam is short questions. I went to a Revision Course in First Year and learned that the best way to study is to constantly test yourself with brief questions and answers".

"There are already a number of Science Revision books out there", adds Kevin "but a lot of them are not that much shorter than the textbook themselves. You could read "Quick Questions & Accurate Answers" in a couple of hours".

The confidence to compete with your teachers doesn't come lightly. The two students have had to make absolutely sure everything that went into the book is factually and grammatically correct. "For our own Junior Certificate Examinations, we had compiled lots of notes in Second & Third Year", says Emmet. "So we started by writing them out together, typing them up and it was imperative we double-check with out Science Teacher that all the information was correct. Then, when we decided to turn it into a book, we got our English Teacher to check for errors also. When you work on a project for so long, you tend to start missing the mistakes".

Not satisfied with just getting the book out there, the two entrepreneurs did some market research in their school amongst Junior Certificate Students and their Teachers. "Students were generally positive about the book, saying they found it easier to study from", says Emmet. "If a student isn't going to study, he won't study no matter how many revision books you give him. But those who would said they had something very straightforward to work from".

The simple format of the book also gives parents the opportunity to help their children revise. "I remember I used to hand my parents my textbook and ask them to quiz me", says Kevin. "But they didn't have any proper knowledge of science so couldn't be much help. With the revision book, parents have actual questions and answers in front of them".

Are there plans for more books after this one? "We have had to self-publish this book and put a lot of our own money and time into it", says Kevin. "We have now set up a Website (www.qqaa.ie) which allows students to order the book and leave comments on it". The boys already have a Business Studies Book written and have plans for a Leaving Certificate Science Revision Book when they've finished the Leaving Certificate Syllabus.


