The altar was composed of two huge rocks, balanced dolmen like, which were taken from the fields beyond the river where the land was reclaimed by the early monks. It took a giant J.C.B. to lift them into place, but when 'in situ' they look as though they were relics of prehistory.

Much of the terracing was done by Fr. Nivard himself assisted by the Mahers of Anngrove. The screen trees were selected from our own woods and in spite of late transplanting and hard weather conditions have continued to survive to date.

The amount of local co-operation which we received in preparation for the Centenary Mass was extraordinarily generous and spontaneous. To mention one item alone. Many of our Protestant neighbours came along and decorated

connected with what was expected to be a huge gathering. The sanctuary area was plotted first and prudent precautions were taken to protect at least the altar and V.I.Ps. Time was to prove how wise this move was. A public address system had to be set up, and an electric organ to accompany the choir had to be installed and tried out.

One evening a few days before the 2nd July the monks had a full dress rehearsal. Stop-watches and tape-measures were used to plot out the movements of every man. It was a full-scale High Mass and every word was heard as clear as a bell on the evening air two miles away. Fr. Kevin the M.C. went to bed happy that night.

AN AILBE ANECDOTE

Shortly after I left Roscrea I got a 'phone call to our house in London. It was the Rev. Father Ailbe asking me if I could do a few business calls with him. Working with my father he gave me the day off plus the car. Our first call was to the late Michael J. Cooke, Chairman of the "National Bank" as it was then. I remember seeing about six tall men dressed on livery uniforms lining each side of the vestibule as we climbed the stairs to his office. After about a half-hour's chat we moved off to "Marconi" Showrooms where his Reverence had an appointment through the late Mr. Lorcan Sherlock. Father Ailbe proceeded to bombard questions to the salesman regarding the capabilities of the various radiograms on show. He insisted that the set must be capable of getting reception from the U.S.A. After an hour or so they eventually showed a set not on the market then which was actually receiving programmes from Chicago. So he ordered it there and then. When we got back to the car I was rather intrigued so I asked him if this was the monastery, jokingly. He told me that the B.B.C. was starting lectures from Cambridge on the radio the following year and he wanted his boys to have these for the Leaving Cert and those going on the university. So our President was certainly far seeing in those days. We finished the day with the late Jack Steacy who was first President of the Old Boys London Section, my late father and myself, with an evening meal at Simpsons in the Strand, selected by his Reverence who as usual knew his way around. A very fine President, may he rest in peace.



inspiring sight with the monks in their white cowls, the priests in stoles and chasubles and the prelates in their purples, led by a thurifer and cross bearer. The local and deanery choir were in full voice, but something had gone wrong with the public address system. This was a major disaster and it spoiled most of the singing and readings. The only one who came across reasonably well was Dr. Cathal Daly, Bishop of Ardagh and Clonmacnoise. In this we were blessed because the burden of his homily was an inspiration not only to the community but to the clergy and laity present on the occasion. One sentence in

his opening paragraph speaks volumes: "Can we do anything better than thank God for the mystery of His love for men, which has so startled and attracted men in this place that they could not bear to live with anyone else or for anyone else but Him alone".


The crowd was not very large, the weather saw to that, but many of those who were there were past students who had not been back for years. One thing we were sorry about was that we had not a special meeting place set aside for such people. The other picture gives some idea of the gathering of priests who Concelebrated the Mass and some four

thousand people received Holy Communion at the Mass.

When the procession returned to the College the hot cup of tea was very welcome and the catering tents set around the grounds were well patronised.

Was it a success? Of course it was. The monks set out to thank God for his graces and blessings, and they did it under the conditions He provided. To conclude on a note once again culled from Dr. Cathal Daly: "The world needs monks... The monk may be separated from the world; but he is a monk for the world. He is the world at prayer".
