

Miracles of organisation are not confined to the time sheet and the secret of seating so many people at the club dining room for what is always an excellent meal would make sardine canners green with envy.





THE KENMARE WEEKEND



TO COMPLAIN Not TO COMPLAIN



Muintearas in Roscrea

R oscrea students often wonder if anything happens in the College while they are on holidays. This article describes the first of four recent weekends spent by the Muintearas group at the College and gives the background of the group.

The ethos is embodied by the three "fire": Fáilte – welcome, as Christ welcomes each one of us we do each other. Foghlaim – learning, we can only grow and love in life by being informed. Guí – that which binds the other two together leading us to a life lit by the joys of faith. There is no formal membership but the movement is peopled by young people from all walks of life who just arrive and take part in what ever happens whether spontaneous or arranged. Age ranges from school leavers upwards, the upper age limit is dictated by whether people are willing to weekend in a sleeping bag or not. There are groups based in Limerick, Dublin, Cork, Galway and indeed in Irish communities abroad. We meet in groups for weekends, nights out and generally for plenty of wholesome craic. The contact person with the group is Hugh Liston ('85-'91) whose Uncle founded the group. Recent past students who wish to come to a weekend should contact Hugh or John Ryan at Baile Mhuire, Foynes, Co. Limerick. The weekends are arranged for friendship, enjoyment and serious discussion.



gether about £500.

International Rugby Star

Ben Cronin, 1981-'86. Capped for Ireland v Scotland, 1995 (cried off due to injury Ireland v France) the following is an extract from the Ireland v France official programme.


Born 13/7/68 in Limerick. 196cm (6' 5") – 103 Kgs. (16st. 2lbs). One Cap.

Ben was educated in the Cistercian College, Roscrea, Waterpark College and Waterford Regional Technical College and is an Exporter. A member of the Garryowen side that won the Insurance Corporation All-Ireland League in 1992 Ben really came to prominence when in only his second outing for Munster he



played a major role in helping them defeat Australia later that year. After playing against Ulster and Connacht in the Interprovincial Championship he won his first "A" cap when scoring a try in Ireland's 23-13 defeat by Scotland "A" at Lansdowne Road in December of that year. He was then selected for the Final Trial but due to injury he had to withdraw and during the 1993 summer he

toured with the Ireland Development Squad to Zimbabwe, Namibia and South Africa. He did not play for Ireland at any level last season but was picked to win his first full cap against the United States last November. Unfortunately he had to withdraw injured but fully fit again he won his second Ireland "A" cap against England "A" at Donnybrook last January, before finally winning his first full cap when playing against Scotland last month.
